Orientation Note:

We begin Monday, January 14 with introductions (graded: one point) to be submitted in "Discussions" no later than Tuesday, January 22. Please know that this participation is required, else you may be dropped from our course. After that please participate in discussions (graded: five points each) and quizzes (graded fifteen points each) every two weeks to correspond with the five modules that constitute our agenda.

On the title of our course: "Environmental Ethics." Let us always be aware of the possible tension between *Environmental* (which suggests empirical description and scientific analysis) and *Ethics* (which suggests philosophical analysis.)

On "Ethics." What should you bring to this course? Officially, the pre-requisite is "college-level reading." But that's just your ticket into this course. Even more important: *open-mindedness*. Philosophy is located in the relation between you and your world, and investigates the notions of truth and reality. Ours is a philosophy course, and we will encounter ideas and themes that are novel and challenging, but only because we have not paid attention to them before. Whatever else philosophy does, it demands this: set aside your attitudes, opinions, feelings; challenge all beliefs that are not supported by argument and evidence. *"Any belief not supported by evidence can be rejected without evidence."* That is our creed.

On “Environment.” Please prepare for some delicious readings with the intention to grasp our subject both historically and topically. And, remember: our goal is objective analysis, not emotional suasion.

II. Course Description:

Critically analyzes theories of value of the natural world. Topics include the relation between scientific and moral principles; theories of the moral worth of persons, animals, plants and other natural objects; historical, religious and cultural influences on conceptions of nature; alternative accounts of human relationships and responsibilities to nature, including deep ecology and eco-feminism; and the connection between moral and political values and economic policies.

III. Student Learning Outcomes, Competencies, and Skills:

- II. Define and explain various cultural, philosophical and religious perspectives on the environment.
- III. Analyze and evaluate the connections between science and technology and issues in environmental ethics.
- IV. Articulate and analyze important environmental issues.
- V. Analyze environmental issues by applying ethical theories and other cultural and religious perspectives.
- VI. Evaluate the effectiveness of various ethical theories in dealing with particular environmental issues.
- VII. Argue effectively about ethical issues in the environment.
- VIII. Analyze various types of environmental activism from an ethical perspective.

IV. IDEA Student Ratings of Instruction:

1. Gaining factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends).
2. Learning fundamental principles, generalizations, or theories.
3. Gaining a broader understanding and appreciation of intellectual/cultural activity (music, science, literature, etc.).

V. Methods and Class Management:

Assignments: Quizzes, and discussions for grade. (Voluntary) essays for extra credit.

- a) Every two weeks submit a short answer quiz; begins immediately after Week One (Introductions.) Six quizzes; drop your lowest grade; 15 points each, for a total of 75 points. Late submissions are grade penalized.
- b) Every two weeks participate in a new online discussion to earn as much as 5 points each; five discussions, possible 25 points. Discussions remain open past their two week period; however, late submissions are grade penalized.
- c) One hundred possible points. Earn ninety to one hundred points: "A"; eighty to eighty-nine points: "B," etc.
- d) *Be sure to participate in discussion, or submit work by January 22, else you may be dropped from our class.*
- e) Please submit all work on Canvas (Information about Canvas: please see below.)
- f) No work can be accepted after our last class, May 3, 2013, midnight. Exceptions to this rule are logistically impossible.
- g) Work submitted late will be grade-penalized.
- h) Please be prepared between classes to engage audio/visual materials online. Please note specific web addresses announced in Canvas.
- i) Please consult final entry of this syllabus for posting of week by week agenda.

Detailed Grading Scale:

*Earn points by submitting quizzes, and, by participating in discussions.

*Opportunity to improve your grade: submit 500-word essay on any topic advertised under our **five modules (see below, Class Schedule, beginning with "Moments to Savor")**, or on a topic agreed upon by you and I.

Quizzes

*After the second week of classes, starting Monday, January 28, six **biweekly** (every two weeks) quizzes, and worth fifteen points each. Drop your lowest scoring quiz; five quizzes remain; at fifteen points each, you can earn as much as seventy-five points in quizzes.

*Quizzes are short answer, combination of multiple choice, and, "True/False". All quizzes worth up to fifteen points.

*Quizzes submitted late are grade-penalized.

Discussions

- ***Discussions** are posted Mondays, every two weeks of the semester. Discussions can earn as much as five points each.
- *Biweekly **discussions** open every other Monday, remain open and work accepted, but are grade-penalized if submitted late.
- ***Discussion** topic posted every other Monday. The purpose of your discussion comments is to demonstrate your understanding of that week's topic.
- *As we gain, week by week, an understanding of major themes, figures, and history of environmental ethics, **discussion** topics will slowly become more subtle. We begin with just this: for one point, introduce yourself and tell us about your interest in environmentalism.
