II. Course Description:

Prerequisite: College Level Reading

General Psychology I is the scientific study of behavior. Topics include motivation, sensation and perception, emotion, physiological psychology, intelligence, research methods, consciousness, neurogenesis, learning, memory, cognition, and language. GT-SS3

This Web course covers fundamental principles and major concepts of psychology using original footage of classic experiments, interviews with renowned psychologists, and documentaries of emerging research. The video programs often feature real-life situations that help students recognize and appreciate how psychology affects the lives of ordinary people and themselves.

III. Student Learning Outcomes, Competencies, and Skills:

The student should be able to:

- A. Describe the discipline of psychology, its history, different theoretical perspectives and how Psychology is practiced today.
- B. Demonstrate the basic rules of research in psychology and be able to evaluate their application.
- C. Identify the biological influences on behavior.
- D. Describe consciousness and factors that may influence it.
- E. Discuss motivation in terms of inherent and learned determinants.
- F. Analyze emotion and its relationship to physiology and cognition.
- G. Define the principles of sensation and perception, and the interplay of the two.
- H. Demonstrate the principles of learning and their application to behavior.

- I. Discuss memory and forgetting, and the application of memory skills to life.
- J. Discuss intelligence from the perspectives of development and assessment.
- K. Describe the development of cognition and language skills.
- L. Write or speak clearly and logically in presentations or essays.
- M. Demonstrate the ability to select and apply contemporary forms of technology to solve problems or compile information.
- N. Read, analyze, and apply written materials to new situations.

IV. IDEA Student Ratings of Instruction:

- 1. Gaining factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends).
- 2. Developing a clearer understanding of, and commitment to, personal values.

V. Methods and Class Management:

The course is divided into 8 modules, each worth a total of 30 points, (3 assignments per module worth 10 points each), plus a midterm research paper/book review worth 60 points. 5 additional points will be assigned for the Orientation Collaborate Session. There are 305 total points available in the class. Please look under each module for a thorough explanation of the assignments and the expectations for completing them.

Extra Credit: You are personally in control of how many points you earn, and what grade you get. If you have fewer points in one area than you want, you can be sure that the opportunity to earn extra points will be available. For the Midterm/Research Paper/Book Report, there will be a Peer Review option that is worth up to 10 points extra credit. Additionally I always assign extra credit points for a job that is above and beyond expectations, (see rubric with each assignment).

Grades: 270-300 points- A, 240-270 points- B, 210-240 points C, 180-210 points D, Below 180- F. I expect students to complete the course with an A or B. If you have not secured enough points to do so, I would love to help you figure out how to increase your points.

To review course expectations:

- read chapters 1-8 of the textbook, *Psychology, Hockenbury and Hockenbury*
- complete one two-page essay or alternative assignment per module
- participate in the Discussion Panel with one posting, and two peer responses for each of the 8 modules
- complete one quiz for each of the 8 modules
- complete a research paper or book review, (prior approval must be received for topic/book. This is the one assignment that is mandatory for class completion regardless of points

- regularly monitor and read all articles, (pages), announcements, and emails posted in our Canvas course. Periodically assignments are revised, this is where you will receive that information.

All work should be completed at a college level. Your work will be assessed not only on the content of your paper, but the quality of your presentation. All work should be typed 12 pt. double spaced unless otherwise noted. Work should be submitted in a timely fashion, by midnight on the due date. The day after an assignment is due the window for submission will close and you will not receive credit for your work. If you have extenuating circumstances, please let me know **AHEAD of time** for consideration.
