II. Course Description:

Provides the EMT student with the clinical experience required of initial and some renewal processes.

III. Student Learning Outcomes, Competencies, and Skills:

Student will be able to successfully demonstrate skills as prescribed by the training center and allowed by the clinical site.

IV. IDEA Objectives

1. Gaining factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends).
2. Learning to apply course material (to improve thinking, problem solving, and decisions).
4. Developing specific skills, competencies, and points of view needed by professionals in the field most closely related to this course.
5. Acquiring skills in working with others as a member of a team.

V. Requirements:

Sign-up for and attend **two clinical rotations** in the Emergency Room/Department for a minimum of eight hours each.

Sign-up for and attend **one field rotation** at an ambulance agency for a minimum of eight/ten hours.

1. Submit a total of 10 Patient Care Reports (PCRs) from these three shifts. All ten can come from one rotation if you like or you can spread them out between the three rotations.
 2. Submit a Clinical Skills Checklist, Preceptor Evaluation, and Student Evaluation for each rotation.
 3. Submit a 2-3 page reflective essay on your clinical/field experiences.

VI. Evaluation Methods:

****Extremely Important: A no call, no show for any assigned clinical/field rotation is grounds for immediate dismissal from the program, both EMS-145, 146 and EMS-170. If you miss any assigned clinical/field rotation for any reason, an immediate review will be conducted by the EMS staff, which, depending on our findings, can result in immediate dismissal from the program. If you are late, there is a good chance you will be sent home. This will also result in an immediate review with the possibility of dismissal from the program.***

If you are sick, then you are sick and should not attend your clinical. Of course, you know that you are sick well before your start time and need to call both myself and the clinical site.

Your final grade for this course will be based on the following:

60%	Clinical/Field PCRs
30%	Reflective Essay
10%	Required Clinical Site Paperwork

Grading Scale will be as follows:

A	90%-100%
B	80%-89%
F	Less 80%

You must receive a B for the course to be eligible to sit for the NREMT-B practical and written examination.

VIII. Required Course Materials

IX. Other Information:

The Reflective Essay is a 2 – 3 page paper describing your clinical experience. This is different from the PCR's—PCR's are objective and talk about your findings but have nothing to do with how you felt, what you learned, any questions on protocols, or other observations about the clinical environment. If you wish, you can also reflect upon your entire EMS experience (Classroom, labs, scenarios, clinicals, etc...).

Take good notes during your shift. Bring a sturdy notebook to write in that fits in your pocket. There is a good chance that you will not be able to fill out any PCR's when on shift. Be prepared to take notes on the fly. If you missed something or need to fill in some blanks, make use of the patient charts, talk to your preceptor, or the attending nurse/EMT. Some physicians will be fine with you asking questions, others might not. Try to read people as best you can.

How to be a good intern...especially at Denver Health...

- You should give yourself an extra 30-45 minutes to get there, but don't show up 30 minutes before your shift.
- Bring money for parking in Denver.
- If you are late due to an unforeseen emergency: flat tire, accident, etc... you must call the site immediately and then give me a call.
- If you have an **absolutely, unavoidable emergency** that requires you to cancel you must first call me and then call the site. This does not mean that there will not be an inquiry into the reason you cancelled.
- Bring your own lunch, preferably something that can be had on the go.
- Bring your cell, directions to the site, my number and the sites number.
- Turn your cell phone off before you walk in the door.

1. **Communicate**. Talk about your difficulties with your instructor.
2. **Get organized**. Write dates in your free student daytimer, set alarms, leave yourself notes.
3. **Get caught up**. Do your reading, submit your assignments.
4. **Visit the learning lab**. If you are struggling with the material this is a great resource.
5. **Visit a counselor**. They have big ears and big hearts. If life is getting in the way of learning, they may be able to offer resources to help. Make an appointment at the Learning Services Desk.
6. **Drop the class**. If you drop before the refund date, you will get your money back. If you drop after the refund date and before the withdraw date, you will not get your money back, but you will not have an “F” on your transcript.
